

WASHINGTON LECISLATIVE SESSION ENDS

In late April, the 2020 Washington state legislative session came to a close. CCA Washington and our obalition partners secured several important victories for conservation and recreational angling, including a S2 million budget provision for a voluntary buyback of non-tobal columbia Silver gilinet Scenses connected with Oregon and Washington conservation referens to transition non-tobal plinets from the mainstern lower Columbia Silver.

Unfortunately, Cav, Indiae vetoed the provision, marking the second year he has vetoed funding for a buyback of Columbia River gibnot licenses. In the Covernor's veto message to the legislature, he claimed that budget proviso language limiting mainstam gill netting 'conficts with 'Washington's agreement with the state of Oregon on the management of commercial gillinet fisheries on the Columbia River."

In truth, the budget proviso would have brought the two states, into much closer eignment, compared to the recent Weshington Fish & Widthe Commission (WFWC) Despite our profound disappointment with Gov. Insiee's veto of the Columbia River gillnet buyback and reforms, we are proud of all we accomplished in this recent legislative session to fund important advancements for recreational fishing, hatcheries, pinniped predation, and salmon conservation – all of which were signed into law by Gov. Insiee. policy decision to increase gill netting on the lower Columbia River mainteen, which conflicted with the polices of the State of Dregon across every single fishing season.

Sady, Governor Inside has done nothing to signal his opposition to the WFWC policies that have resulted in the eight months since the decision was made instead, his tetest who of a widely supported gillnet license buyback provision casts serious doubt on the Covernor's commitment to protect BSA-listed salmon and staelhead in the Columbia River.

Salmon fishing to close early in San Juan Islands following successful opener

OLYMPIA – Fishery managers at the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) announced today an early closure to salmon fishing in the San Juan Islands (Marine Area 7) to meet conservation objectives for Chinook salmon following highly successful catch rates. The closure goes into effect July 8.

"Since the season kicked off July 1, Chinook fishing has really taken off in the San Juan Islands," said Kyle Adicks, WDFW's intergovernmental salmon manager. "So much so that the total Chinook catch has already met the quota for the full month of July. This closure helps to support salmon conservation and preserve fishing opportunities in the future."

Staff will continue analyzing data and will reevaluate whether fishing for coho salmon may reopen later in the summer while remaining within management guidelines for Chinook incidentally caught and released. The Bellingham Bay fishery as described in the 2021-22 Sport Fishing Rules Pamphlet will continue as planned.

Anglers should check the Washington Sport Fishing Rules pamphlet at wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/regulations and WDFW's emergency rules page at fortress.wa.gov/dfw/erules/efishrules/ before heading out, and download the Fish Washington mobile app for up-to-date regulations at their destination.

Puget Sound salmon seasons are a result of an annual collaborative state and tribal salmon seasonsetting process known as North of Falcon, which WDFW uses to preserve, protect and perpetuate fish, while providing sustainable fish recreational and commercial opportunities. The public is invited to participate in this process in late winter each year.

RECIPE



Pan Seared Red Snapper With Summer Corn Salad

The red mapper population in the Galf of Mexico has never been healthier so onjoy this timely recipe and be sure to check out the editorial on page 8 – The Foheru That Word Stay Select.

ingredients

DRESSING

- V₂ c misyonnalse
- 1/2 C SOUR CREATE
- 2 Usip fresh lernon-or linne julice
- thep Chotula (or favorita hot sauce)

CORN SALAD

- 1/2 Cfresh cilantro, chopped
- 1/4 c fresh basil, chopped
- 1 thisp fresh jalapeno, diced
- 1/1 c green onion, chopped
- ears fresh corn, grilled or soasted, kernels removed (making about 2 cups kernels)
- 1 c fresh tornato, seeded and cloed
- 1 clove gartic, grated
- TS oz can seasoned black bears, drained and knoed
- 2 ripe avocados, dicad

RED SNAPPER

- 4 medium red snapper filets
- 2 tbsp all-purpose flour
- 2 top Calun seasoning
- tsp-peprika
- 3 thip vegetable of

directions

DRESSING: Make directing by mixing together maybrinaise, sour cream, Intsh lemon or ime juice and Cholula until combined, set acide.

CORN SALAD: Pour half of the prepared dressing into a large mixing boal. Add in the ciloritro, basil, jalapeno, green onion, com kernels, tomata, gartic and black beens and gently stir. Once combined, gently fold in the diced avocado, taking care not to mash the avocado pieces too much. Set askde for serving.

RED SNAPPER: Lay all four filets out on a outling board or sheet pan. Lightly dust all sides evenly with the flour, then season all sides evenly with the Cajun seasoning and paprils.

Heat oil in a large skillet to medium-high. Once oil is hot, add filets to the pan and cook for about 5 minutes, or until golden brown. Flip filets and cook an additional 3-5 minutes, until fish is cooked through and golden brown. Once cooked through, set aside for plating.

TO SERVE: Evenly distribute the corn saled onto four separate dinner plates. Top each plated salad with a snapper Net. If desired, finish plating by drizding some of the extra dressing over the filets and saled, gemish with extra herbs or lemon wedges. SERVES 4.


